Minister's Report

This is my first report as the Minister of Waterloooville Baptist Church. I find it difficult to think I have only been here just a little over six months because within such a seemingly short amount of time so much has happened.

On the whole we have been welcomed and encouraged by the Church family but of course family life is never without its challenges.

We said goodbye to Wendy and Rev Elgan Evans as they resigned their membership from WBC and settled elsewhere and we have also seen the resignation of David Barnes from the positions of Treasurer and Trustee. We acknowledge all of the hard work and service that all 3 gave for the church at WBC especially alongside many others during the Lockdown's of Covid.

Even in the midst of the challenges, we have been able to see God's hand at work. We continue to pray and seek after God's own heart, especially with regards to whom He would have fill the roles of Church Secretary and Treasurer. We can't thank Stephen Foster enough for his steadfast work on the Finances through challenging times and Karen for her steadfast support.

Change is never easy, whilst some people embrace change, many fight against it without even realising that is what they are doing and especially in these Covid times, 'what we know; the familiar' is comforting for many of us.

It was exciting to be able to open the church building for our Sunday services and for the groups that meet during the week. It is good to see some sort of 'new normal' in these recent days but it is really good to reflect on lessons learnt during these times and to hear if anything what the Lord has been saying to us. Whilst some of the church programmes have started up, others have ceased to continue, this is always sad but at times necessary. We celebrate all that has gone before and thank God for His faithfulness through the years.

Over the last 6 months, as a diaconate we have been able to build a stronger team, with the welcome additions of Steve Harding and Sarah Newell. Together, we are beginning to see something of God's vision for the Church through the potential of the installation of a Renew Wellbeing Café at the front of the building; a safe, welcoming and prayerful space for individuals who are struggling with life. Recently we heard the news that we will be the Church of the Year 2023 and that the Regional Team will start to promote our project in autumn 2022. This should be an encouragement to us as we move forward.

I have been able to draw alongside those who are leading groups within the church and have tried to encourage and support them where possible and I have managed to build relationships with many of the mum's that attend Toddlers and Mum's Matters as well as those who attend the Home-Ed Group. Myself and others have been into Padnell Junior School, QI School and Denmead Infants delivering lessons on specific topics, the last being 'Special Books' and whilst our Community Carols Service was unable to go ahead last year, hopefully this year schools will be able to be part of it in Dec 2022 as we continue to build relationships within our community.

Sadly, we have more recently and unexpectedly seen members promoted to Glory due to illness and old age this year. They will be hugely missed and remembered often but we take comfort from the Hope they and we have in Jesus, the Hope of Eternal Life.

I am really excited to see all that God has in store for us at Waterlooville Baptist Church, I am eager see how we will Thrive and Flourish in the months and years ahead; as we walk together, seeking to 'Be' God's People and to 'Do' His will in our lives, the life of the Church and within the community that He has planted us.

Children and Families Leaders Report

Wow I can't believe we are at the end of January 2022, and it's that time again to write an annual report, how quickly the time goes, as we all know 2021 was a funny year with us still living with restrictions and still not being able to do things due to covid, I certainly learnt very quickly of things we could and couldn't do and made sure the rules were followed for our children's groups.

Of course, no groups went back until September, so before this I spent a lot of time contacting families either by email or by setting a zoom call up so we could keep in contact with the families and children, I was also able to go for weekly walks as the restrictions allowed us to meet outside, these weekly walks were crucial and were valued by the mums. I also spent time planning for our new home education group that should have started in April 2020 and also met with one of my helpers to try and come up with a plan and how the group would run.

Thankfully all groups were able to start running again in September 2021 and what an amazing feeling it was, being back doing the job I love, my passion has always been working alongside families and sharing God's love with them in a way that helps them, so it was so good to welcome them back into the church again and to have the buzz about the place.

Our Home education group finally started on the 8th September 2021 and I have to admit I was so worried that we wouldn't get many attending, but I really didn't need to, the first week we had 12 families join us which doesn't sound like many and I have to admit I was a little disheartened but I didn't need to be as the following week we welcomed 27 children and since September we see up to 28 children most weeks, some weeks are quieter but most of the time we are near enough full, our maximum we can take is 30.

This group has been a true blessing to our church, the families are so supportive and will help with donations etc when we ask them to, the harvest collection was just truly amazing as we collected 2 big boxes of donations for the food bank from Home ed, truly amazing, and I can really see God at work in this group and can't wait to see what else he will do with in this group.

Mums matter also started back in September although we did meet once a week in Jubilee Park, whilst restrictions allowed. I would like to say a huge thank you to Pam Vickerstaff, Sue Longley and Maureen Walker for all their help with the group up until Covid happened, I am sad they have left the group but I know it was the right time for them, God is truly at work with this group as admittedly I wasn't sure if we could even continue to run the group without my 3 helpers but a lot of praying was done and I am very pleased that Rachel Nassif has offered to come and help with this group and support the mums, we have seen one of the families come to church more regularly and also Sandra (Luca's mum) has offered to be DBS checked so she can also lead the group, this is truly amazing, the support all these mums give each other is such a lovely blessing to see and I know they value the group.

Children's church has been mainly been running by me and we try to follow the same theme as the sermon each week but sometimes this can be a bit tricky, so I will always pick something that fits the best it can.

If anyone would ever like to help out with the Children's church you would be most welcome to join, please come and chat with me if you would like more information.

My thanks to Pat and the other helpers who have stepped in to help as and when needed. It is very much appreciated.

I have loved being part of the Sunday morning services and either helping in the worship band or doing a children's talk, thank you to you all for going along with whatever I decide to make you do on a Sunday morning whether it is being taped up or walking around the church doing exercise, the craziness is very much appreciated.

Lastly it was great to welcome Rev Sandra and have someone I can work alongside and also spend time in prayer with, I am excited to see what 2022 will bring to WBC and what God has in store for us all.

Deacons Report (in lieu of a Church Secretary's Report)

With the induction of the Revd Sandra Platford on 25 September 2021, we saw the beginning of a new chapter in the life of Waterlooville Baptist Church. In her first few months, Sandra has already brought a renewed sense of expectancy of what God has in store for us if we are open to Him.

It had been over three years since the Revd Bill Longley had retired, a relatively long period of reflection and time seeking God's way forward for us as a fellowship. During this time, we were fortunate to have the support and guidance of the Revd Jonathan Edwards, as our moderator. When he agreed to come and help us, chairing his first church meeting in December 2018, I don't think he would have for one moment realised on how many occasions he would make the journey between his home in Newbury to Waterlooville. Car issues and the weather made some of these particularly eventful. Of course, he could have made many more trips, but for the pandemic. In particular, Jonathan helped the deacons to maintain the search for a new minister during the restrictions imposed as a result of Covid. Whilst other churches paused their search, the deacons continued to meet prospective ministers online. We also thank Jonathan for his overall leadership and ministry during this time.

And so it was that in March, Sandra's name came to the diaconate, not via the usual route, but clearly God's hand was at work in a number of conversations that took place. Sandra had been a minister in training at the church some ten years previously. The deacons met with Sandra online twice, during which times both asked the other a number of probing questions. Sandra preached with a 'squint' on Palm Sunday and was then invited to preach with a view on 2 May, followed by an online forum during which people could raise questions. At the church meeting later that week, it was an almost unanimous decision (98%) to call her to be our minister. Sandra accepted this call and along with Bryan and Liona moved into the manse in June. Using this month to settle back into the Waterlooville area, her ministry started in earnest in July.

Due to the challenge of coordinating several people's diaries, Sandra's induction service did not take place until September – I think it is fair to say that it was worth the wait! With Revd Colin Norris presiding, the Revd Hayley Young gave the message based on Romans 12 and New Life in Christ. (Hayley has been elected President of our Baptist Union 2022-23.)

It was good to be joined on this occasion by so many people, those who have journeyed with the church and/or Sandra over the years, plus key members of the community.

By the time of the induction, many of us were becoming more familiar to being back in the building. The first half of the year saw us continuing to meet on a

Sunday for worship online. Whilst many churches opted to use Facebook or YouTube, the online meeting format we adopted allowed different people to contribute each week. We are grateful for all those who made this possible, including those leading the services, preaching, reading the bible, leading our prayers, and providing children's talks. Over the summer we transitioned, with the services initially being led from the building, with the congregation all online, to a hybrid model with the congregation both in the building and online. One of the positive outcomes of the pandemic is that we have learned how to offer our services online and we will continue to do so for those who for whatever reason are unable or choose not to join us in person. We still have much to learn about this new style of ministry, but thank God for what he has helped us accomplish thus far.

As our Children and Families Leader, Amy continued to support various groups, firstly online and then as the groups returned to the building (read more of these elsewhere). For the first time following Sandra's arrival, Amy has been able to work in tandem with a minister, something I know she had been very much looking forward to. We have already seen the two of them work well together on several activities. It has been particularly good to see a number of opportunities open up with the local schools, something that many of us had been praying to see. Near the end of the year, we were also blessed with the news of a generous anonymous gift to help fund the role of the Children and Families Leader for the year ahead.

Two members of the diaconate stepped down during the year; firstly, Wendy Evans who had been Acting Church Secretary and secondly David Barnes from the position of Church Treasurer. We are extremely grateful for their service in these roles, both of which require specific skills and commitment. Whilst at the end of the year both of these roles remain vacant, we do look forward to the input of Sarah Newell and Steve Harding, elected to the diaconate at the end of the year. The diaconate is particularly grateful for the ongoing work of Steve Foster, as Finance Officer, who has helped us enormously during the time without a treasurer

During 2021 we said farewell to a number of people who moved to worship elsewhere and others who were called home. Whilst we have welcomed some new people, the church does face a challenge moving forward, both in terms of the number of people able to carry out roles in the life of the church and financially. We thank God for all who contribute to the life of our church in so many different ways and we pray for God's continued guidance as we move through 2022.

Boys' Brigade

2021 started, as many of our organisations did, in lockdown and sadly, very inactive. We continued to share online the opportunities BB at Home that were available and keep in touch with our boys via their parents as best as possible when appropriate.

Once the warmer weather approached and restrictions eased, we began to work out meeting outdoors which we were able to start in mid-June. It was great to be able to see the smiling faces of our boys as we met at Jubilee Park and took in some activities in Park Wood when the weather allowed us. We rounded off the few weeks we had together with various games and sports in Jubilee Park in the sunshine with the thoughts turning to September.

The return to our regular and full activities began in earnest in September. My thought was that September represented an opportunity to restart afresh with a view to grow and let our local communities know that BB was available for our boys and young men to get involved with. It was an exciting and slightly daunting prospect as we only knew that we would have around 11 boys coming along when we restarted.

The autumn term has mostly been about Monday nights and raise awareness of them happening. Amy has been fantastic in helping me share with various groups and connections to achieve this and we have also had 2 newspaper articles and a regular slot in the St Peters Newsletter. Our Mondays have seen us getting stuck into the brilliant material that BB provides to help us shape our programme around the 6 areas: Get Active,

Get Adventurous, Get Creative, Get into the Bible, Get Involved and Get Learning along with our own ideas. We've had a chocolate themed evening, made bread, a curry night, an evening based on Taskmaster and we were able to hold a small awards evening.

Our Senior group have embarked on their Bronze Duke of Edinburgh's Award with expedition skills and training, along with a couple of them volunteering each week at the local Junior Park Run event in Jubilee Park. Hopefully we will be able to see these guys off completing expeditions and camping this spring and summer.

Battalion and wider BB events have slowly started to return. We had 4 boys head to Alice Holt to take part in Mid-Southern England Battalion Orienteering challenge in October. In December 5 boys joined with boys from Portsmouth and Wymering for a game's night and sleepover at Copnor Methodist Church, our first night away in 2 years!

We have been able to welcome Josh Thomas, Claire Ware, Sophie Saunders and Daron Blackmore to our leadership team which is enabling us to offer a wider range of activities and keep our evenings flowing. I would say that our team is by no way complete and as we grow our section's we need to continue to pray that we can have enough leaders to keep the quality of the programme we are running. We are still keen for outside influences with those who have skills or interests that could be shared with the boys to help the diversity of the programme.

We rounded off 2021 with a Christmas party. Anchors and Juniors had funfair style games and challenges before enjoying some party food and the Company and Seniors had games with some pizza from Giorgios!

Our last evening of the year saw us with 25 boys and 2022 has started the same way with 3 new boys already coming along to see what BB has to offer. Hopefully it will lead on to exciting times for the Company.

I am thankful as ever for the commitment and enthusiasm of the leaders, without them none of the activities would be able to take place and we wouldn't be able to share our skills and faith with them. We are also thankful for a number of key supporters who continue to support us whilst not necessarily being with us on a weekly basis.

September, and what a joy it was, to see prams and bricks, the dolls' house and a train set, the tool bench and the kitchen in the Owens Hall, and even more joyful, to see toddlers playing with them again, and mothers and babies ensconced in the Baby Area.

Earlier in the year we did manage to "see" some of the children on-line, as we had zoom Toddlers from February until Easter. The children shared their news, listened to a story, joined in a singing time, and subsequently had a craft activity delivered to their homes.
